The possessive apostrophe (singular nouns)

An apostrophe is used to show possession. In singular nouns it comes before the letter 's'.

For example: **Megan's** Mum is fab! (the Mum who belongs to Megan)

Ravi's shoes are blue. (the shoes that belong to Ravi) The **girl's** hair is blonde. (the hair that belongs to the girl)
